ur journey together as a new Executive began one year ago. Although we were unable to be together physically due to the COVID 19 pandemic, God allowed us to meet more times than usual using social media platforms for orientation sessions, officers/executive/committee meetings, prayer and daily Bible devotionals. We were able to **rejuvenate** the interest of five member affiliates in the last year, and the team continues to **recruit** and encourage younger women for the ministry. God has been directing us during this time of restrictions on our islands due to the pandemic, to readjust and realign our women's ministry for greater effectiveness post COVID19. We will remain focussed on growth and development as we prepare another generation of women leaders for ministry.

A very special thank you to all the women of CBWU: Officers, Island Presidents and members who have contributed towards the successful fulfilment of our strategic goals in the past year. To God be the glory, honour and praise!

Luke 2:36-38

In spite of her loss and sadness, she spent a lot of time talking to God and learnt to be contented in all circumstances.



Anna had a special gift from the Lord and felt honoured that God would choose her for service. This made her devote more of herself to God through **praying**, **fasting and encouraging the women who came to the temple to pray.** She never left the temple. IMPACT OF COVID LY ON WOMEN AND GIRLA

omen around the world make significant contribution to their societies in nation-building, not only as home-makers, but to the global economy as well. Also true is that women everywhere are faced with similar and various challenges. Issues and concerns such as domestic violence, abuse, immense poverty, lack of formal education and lack of economic opportunities have had an enormous negative impact on women's ability to feed themselves and their families.

The situation has been worsened by the COVID19 pandemic • because of the existing structural inequalities across every sector: from health to economy, security to social protection. What is also true is that in times of crisis, when resources are scarce and institutional capacity is limited, women and girls face disproportionate impact with far reaching adverse • consequences.

While response to the onslaught of the global pandemic will in some way alleviate or correct existing inequalities, there is urgent need to build a resilient world that will provide safeguards for the most vulnerable who are affected in the following ways:



- Many women are trapped at home with their abusers. This forced confinement has increased the risk of domestic violence against them. For example, conflicts that arise around domestic and family issues contribute to violent outbursts and attacks.
- The confinement of girls also facilitates an increase in abuse and sexual violence against them. In addition, girls' education is severely interrupted because of the un-availability of resources necessary for Home-Schooling.
- Women and girls are also impacted by cyber violence. Because the internet has become the most fundamental tool for accessing information, education, work and other services, there is greater exposure to them being victims of online sexual predators. *UN Secretary, Policy Brief 2020*

A CALL TO PRAY!

PEOPLE OF GOD, IT'S TIME TO PRAY!

The COVID 19 pandemic and its devastating effects have left many – even believers – fearful, weakened and depressed. Yet, the story of Peter's miraculous delivery from prison in **Acts 12** serves as a wonderful reminder to us that God works when churches pray and Satan still trembles, "when he sees the weakest saint upon his knees" (William Cowper).

Peter was imprisoned by Herod and was on death row, "but constant prayer was offered to God for him by the Church." (Acts 12:5) The Church was united and intense in their intercession in obedience to Jesus' command, "men always ought to pray and not to faint" (Luke 18:1) **People of God!** We should never underestimate the power of a praying Church! Jesus said, "I also tell you this, "If two of you agree here on earth concerning anything you ask, My Father in heaven will do it for you." (Matthew 18:19, NLT) Peter was at peace, trusting God because he knew that his life was in God's hands! When the angel came that night, he woke Peter and told him to follow him. Peter's chains fell off and apparently the guards were put to sleep by the angel. Miraculously, Peter was led out of the prison and once he was outside, the angel disappeared. He went straight to the house of John Mark's mother where the Church was still praying for him. They did not expect their prayers to be answered so soon. Peter shared how God had delivered him and everyone rejoiced.

People of God! These are difficult times; change and decay is all around us. The world is dark and is getting darker; but we have a friend in Jesus and the wonderful and awesome privilege of taking **everything** to God in prayer. No matter how difficult the trials or how disappointing the news, God is still on the throne and He always remembers His own.

Our God hears and answers prayer. "Our God is able to do exceedingly, abundantly above all that we ask or think, according to the power that works in us, [so] to Him be glory in the Church by Christ Jesus to all generations, forever and ever." (Ephesians 3:20-21)

MENTAL HEALTH AND COVID - 19

ore than one year into dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic and there is still so much uncertainty. When will this end? How much longer will we have to continue with the restrictions? Wearing masks? Sanitizing? Distancing?

Many are suffering from 'COVID fatigue', anxiety and depression. There is so much death, despair and sadness. What is God saying? He continues to speak and the message is consistent. He tells us in His Word to 'daily renew our minds'; 'guard our minds and heart'; and, "to not be anxious" (Rom, 12:2; Prov. 4:23-24; Phill. 4: 6-7). This is a reminder that the Lord is concerned about every aspect of our lives, including our mental health.

In addition to meditating on God's Word and spending time in prayer, here are some additional tips which can help us to protect and preserve our mental health especially during crises. Maintain a healthy lifestyle by:

- Having a proper diet which includes fruits and vegetables.
- Exercising at least 3 times per week for 30 minutes each session.
- Sleeping so that your body can rest and rejuvenate.
- Maintain social contacts with family and friends by phone, what's app messaging, email, etc.
- Talk to a counsellor, healthcare worker or someone you can trust, if you feel overwhelmed. Have a plan and know where to go or who to contact in the event that you may need physical and/or mental help. Do not use drugs or alcohol to deal with your emotions.

- Lessen the time that you and your family spend watching or listening to television, radio, social media postings or any other type of news coverage that you may find contributes to increased levels of anxiety.
- Take the time to learn a new skill or hobby, example: gardening, playing an instrument, baking, etc. This will help you to occupy your mind and thoughts positively.
- Get the facts from credible sources you can trust.
 This type of information will help you to take the necessary precautions to protect you and your family.

Finally, if you have children in your care, please give them some extra time, love and attention. Children can develop mental health issues due to stress and may respond in different ways. We do not know what the future holds, especially as it relates to the COVID -19 pandemic. However, we serve a God who knows and who has already made the provisions for us to cope. Let us continue to lean on Him as we support, encourage and strengthen each other in the faith.



Khurma Recipe

Ingredients

1 lb. flour

½ cup shortening

½ cup butter

½ tsp cinnamon powder

1 tsp ginger powder 1 tbs ginger (grated)

½ cup water to knead flour

1 cup sugar

2 tbsp condensed milk (optional)

Method

Sift flour, add cinnamon, ginger powder and cut in

butter and shortening. Add the water and condensed milk gradually and mix to form a firm but hard enough dough. Cut in two parts. Roll out each part about ½ inch thick. Cut into strips (according to what size you want). Drop batch into hot oil. Make sure all is covered with the oil. Deep fry until golden brown and crispy. Remove and drain on napkins or brown paper to soak up oil.

Syrup

½ cup water

1 cup sugar (half brown, half white) 2 the grated ginger or more based on your taste for ginger Bring ingredients to boil until thick syrup is formed. The syrup is ready when it drips from the spoon and forms long threads. Pour syrup over khurma, mix quickly to glaze khurma. Leave to cool before serving.
